In Scripture Today

Matthew 15:[10-20] 21-28

Although Matthew's gospel repeatedly connects the Christian community with Jewish tradition, chapter 15, near to the center of the gospel, includes several of the passages that broaden the picture. According to the evangelist, Jesus altered the traditional emphasis about ritual purity to one about interior obedience to God, and in the narrative of the healing the Canaanite woman, Jesus praised the faith of a Gentile. It is likely that Matthew, writing in the 80s and not quoting Jesus verbatim, is correcting some in his community who understood the Messiah as saving only the Israelites: Matthew's church now includes both Jews and Gentiles.

Isaiah 56:1, 6-8

Into the new situation of post-exilic Israel, Third Isaiah spoke a surprising poem that welcomes non-Jews into the worship life of the temple. The prophet hopes to alter Israelite enmity with a focus on divine mercy. This openness to the outsider represents a totally opposite view of the return from exile from the one indicated in Ezra and Nehemiah.

Romans 11:1-2a, 29-32

Paul's letter to the Romans continues his argument about the relationship between Jews and Gentiles in the Christian community. Apparently, Christian openness to Gentiles had led some to assume that now the Jews had been rejected from divine mercy. In this passage, Paul stressed that while being open to Gentiles, God will also continue to bless the Jews.

More Reflections from Today's Scripture


We Are Beggars, This Is True

"We are beggars; this is true," are reported to be Martin Luther's last written words. Christians are "beggars" for God's grace, undeserving but graced nonetheless. A beggar's faith focuses not on what is given or accomplished or believed, but on what is received: the healing and sustenance desperately longed for and needed.

In today's gospel, the Canaanite woman is such a "beggar" for Jesus' healing for her daughter. She is denied a place at the table at first, but she will accept even "crumbs" in the faith that Jesus' healing power and love are intended even for her. As a Gentile outsider, she inhabits the margins of Jesus' mission to the "lost sheep of the house of Israel." Jesus' eventual response to her beggar's faith reveals that the love of God even encompasses the margins.

Marginalized or not, we are all beggars before God, as Paul reminds the Romans—all "imprisoned in disobedience" and dependent on God. Thus, our sense of "insider" and "outsider" crumbles in the face of our common need and God's abundant mercy to all. Instead of dividing people between those who have a place at the table and those who get crumbs, we have an opportunity to share hospitality with our fellow beggars.

It can be challenging to see ourselves as beggars. Today the Canaanite woman becomes our model, as she persists with both humility and audacity. As disciples of Jesus and "beggars" for God's grace, we live the same paradox of humility and audacity, boldly coming to Jesus and humbly acknowledging our need. Even though crumbs from God's table would be enough for us, we are offered instead the abundance of Jesus' own self in bread and wine and invited to share this abundance with insider and outsider alike. -From Sundays and Seasons
